The main focus of the book is the VANITY of of material, earthly things — 1:1-11:9

The main point of the book is the importance of serving God throughout life — cf. 11:9-12:1, 13-14



ECCLESIASTES

Very IMPORTANT to keep the object and theme of the book in mind when analyzing its particular statements! In this lesson: THE VANITY OF STRIVING AFTER EARTHLY WISDOM

The true VALUE of MATERIAL THINGS

The book illustrates the vanity of life when looked at solely from an earthly perspective

The words of the "preacher" in Hebrew, קֹהֶלֶת Qoheleth (875a); the teacher, leader of an assembly ... Solomon

Ecclesiastes 1:1 (NKJV) ¹ The words of the Preacher, the son of David, king in Jerusalem.



Ecclesiastes 1:12–13 (NKJV) ¹ I, the Preacher, was king over Israel in Jerusalem. ¹³ And I set my heart to seek and search out by wisdom concerning all that is done under heaven; ... Koheleth was determined in his quest for wisdom. He "set" or fixed his "heart."

The heart is the seat, not only of affections, but of the understanding and intellectual faculties generally. — Equivalent to setting the mind to the task



Ecclesiastes 1:12–13 (NKJV) ¹ I, the Preacher, was king over Israel in Jerusalem. ¹³ And I set my heart to seek and search out by wisdom concerning all that is done under heaven; ... "To seek" (darash- implies penetrating into the depth of an object) and "to search out" (turtaking a comprehensive survey) the mysteries of life.

The instrument by which these researches would be conducted was "wisdom."

He wished to investigate the causes and conditions of things of the world - "under the sun"



Ecclesiastes 1:12–13 (NKJV) ¹ L the Preacher, was king over Israel in Jerusalem. ¹³ And I set my heart to seek and search out by wisdom concerning all that is done under heaven; ... We determine values, priorities, goals, & focus! – Mat. 6:19-21, 33; Rom 12:1,2; Col 3:1,2

- Wisdom Application of knowledge & Seeing the end of a thing . . .
 - Focus is the result of conduct & the earthly consequences ...
 - Two kinds of wisdom, Human & divine - (James 3:15-17) - results in VERY DIFFERENT perspectives!


"This burdensome task" —




The Quest To Understand IS MEANINGLESS

"This burdensome task" —

- Young's Literal Translation: – ... "It [is] a sad travail God hath given to the sons of man to be humbled by it."
 - Part of that which distinguishes humans from animals is the desire to know origin, destiny and purpose; to understand the why and how of all things.



(NKJV) 13 this burdensome task burdensome task God has given to the sons of man, by which they may be exercised.

Ecclesiastes 1:12–13

"This burdensome task" —

The sons of men - not just God's covenant people tirelessly seek the answers to millions and millions of questions ...

Though this compulsion to know is God-given, the effort to know is full of frustration. - HUMBLING!



Ecclesiastes 1:14 ¹⁴ I have seen all the works that are done under the sun; and indeed. all is vanity and grasping for the wind.

"An exhaustive study" —

- His shocking ("INDEED!") discovery was that "all is vanity and striving after wind."
- All human endeavor is unsubstantial and ultimately unsatisfying.
- No matter how thoroughly a person investigates, how broad the area is that is taken in hand, it is found to be a rather fruitless endeavor (1:14).



(NKJV) ¹⁵ What is crooked cannot be made straight, And what is lacking cannot be numbered.

Ecclesiastes 1:15

"An unavoidable conclusion" — Eccl 7:13; Mat 6:27

- Life presents many problems which the keenest intellect cannot explain nor rectify.
- The greatest mathematician cannot add figures which do not exist. So the wisdom of man cannot supply the defects which come to notice when he examines life (1:15)..

- We have His word His will His way - His judgments — Is. 40:8; 1 Peter 1:22-25; Gal 1:6-9
- We can choose but, we do not have the option to NOT choose! — Rom 6:16,17
 - We will die Heb 9:27
 - We will be accountable before Him for how we live our lives! — Eccl. 12:13,14; 2 Cor. 5:10



Ecclesiastes 1:16 (NKJV)

¹⁶ I communed with my heart, saying, 'Look, I have attained greatness, and have gained more wisdom than all who were before me in Jerusalem. My heart has understood great wisdom and knowledge."

Solomon knew of himself

- He had found great success in material things – 1 Kings 10:7,23; Luke 12:16-21
 - He had gained great wisdom and knowledge - 1 Kings 4:30; 2:Chr. 9:22,23
 - He had done the utmost to acquire wisdom, yet he was still unable to explain the anomalies of life (1:16).



The Intensified Quest (1:17-18)

Ecclesiastes -18 (NKJV And I set my heart to know wisdom and to know madness and folly. I perceived that this also is grasping to the wind. 18 For in much wisdom is much grief, And he who increases knowledge increases sorrow.

Solomon's experiment experienced it all

- He left no stone unturned. He even explored the opposite of wisdom ...
- He learned **madnesses** (holeloth- confusion of thought) and "**folly**" (sikhluth - vice and wickedness).



Produced nothing of lasting value - Chasing the wind!



The Intensified Quest (1:17-18)

Ecclesiastes

¹⁷ And I'set my heart to know wisdom and to have madness and folly. I perceived that this also is grasping tor the wind. ¹⁸ For in much wisdom *is* much grief, And he who increases knowledge increases

Increased wisdom & knowledge is frustrating.

- Leads one to find out many disturbing things producing "**vexation**" or irritation (ka^cas),
- "Sorrow" grows out of getting more knowledge, many things are hopelessly bent to evil.
- Becomes ever more conscious of his ignorance & impotence, against the great evils which he is powerless to remedy.



The Intensified Quest (1:17-18)

Ecclesiastes -18 (NKJV And I set my heart to know wisdom and to know madness and folly. I perceived that this also is grasping to the wind. 18 For in much wisdom is much grief, And he who increases knowledge increases sorrow.

Increased wisdom & knowledge is frustrating.

- More responsibility —
- More burdens to bear —
- More conscious of
 - Reality . . .
 - Limitations . . .
 - Dangers of ignorance



ECCLESIASTES

There are areas where human effort is futile - (14,15) We CANNOT change or control things beyond our grasp.

The search for human wisdom has its problems - (16-18) / Not easily gained / Brings about grief / Increases sorrow -




ECCLESIASTES
