






Ecclesiastes 2:3 (NKJV)

³ I searched in my heart *how* to gratify my flesh with wine, while guiding my heart with wisdom, and how to lay hold on folly, till I might see what *was* good for the sons of men to do under heaven all the days of their lives.







¹ I said in my heart, "Come now, I will test you with mirth; therefore enjoy pleasure"; but surely, this also was vanity. 2 I said of laughter —"Madness!"; and of mirth, "What does it accomplish?" ³ I searched in my heart how to gratify my flesh with wine, while guiding my heart with wisdom, and how to lay hold on folly, till I might see what was good for the sons of men to do under heaven all the days of their lives. ⁴ I made my works great, I built myself houses, and planted myself vineyards.

⁵ I made myself gardens and orchards, and I planted all kinds of fruit trees in them. 6 I made myself water pools from which to water the growing trees of the grove. 7 I acquired male and female servants, and had servants born in my house. Yes, I had greater possessions of herds and flocks than all who were in Jerusalem before me. 8 I also gathered for myself silver and gold and the special treasures of kings and of the provinces. I acquired male and female singers, the delights of the sons of men, and musical instruments of all kinds.

⁹ So I became great and excelled more than all who were before me in Jerusalem. Also my wisdom remained with me. 10 Whatever my eyes desired I did not keep from them. I did not withhold my heart from any pleasure, For my heart rejoiced in all my labor; And this was my reward from all my labor. 11 Then I looked on all the works that my hands had done And on the labor in which I had toiled; And indeed all was vanity and grasping for the wind. There was no profit under the sun.


12 Then I turned myself to consider wisdom and madness and folly; For what can the man do who succeeds the king? — Only what he has already done. 13 Then I saw that wisdom excels folly As light excels darkness. 14 The wise man's eyes are in his head, But the fool walks in darkness. Yet I myself perceived That the same event happens to them all.

15 So I said in my heart, "As it happens to the fool, It also happens to me, And why was I then more wise?" Then I said in my heart, "This also is vanity." 16 For there is no more remembrance of the wise than of the fool forever, Since all that now is will be forgotten in the days to come. And how does a wise man die? As the fool! 17 Therefore I hated life because the work that was done under the sun was distressing to me, for all is vanity and grasping for the wind.




The true VALUE of MATERIAL THINGS







- He resolves to experiment with a series of activities which delight the human senses.
- All turns out to be "VANITY," (vs. 1), ... "all was vanity and grasping for the wind." (vs. 11)




- "I said in my heart." language similar to that used by the rich fool in Jesus' parable (Lk 12:20).
- He purposefully set his course upon sensual pleasure, i.e., that which delights the senses without being necessarily sinful. (mirth (simchah) = harmless amusements and delights).
- Finding pleasure in these things turned out to be a fruitless endeavor a waste of time




- Koheleth evaluated "laughter" as "mad," i.e., as totally irrational.
- He said, "What does "mirth" do?
 Does it contribute toward the goal of real happiness & satisfaction?
 - Does it fill the void in one's soul?
 - Does it give lasting satisfaction?
- Israel's wise men were quite aware of the fact that a jolly exterior can mask a heavy heart (cf. Prov 14:13 "even in laughter the heart may sorrow, and the end of mirth may be grief").




- "I searched in my heart "— He investigated, he made another experiment with wine 2:3
- "while guiding my heart with wisdom, " Deliberately and with restraint, not blindly or in uncontrolled excess (cf. v. 9b)—
- He was playing w/ fire Many have thought they could "drink responsibly" to only have "drink" be their ruin! — (Pr. 20:1; 23:29–35.)




- Koheleth determined to "lay hold on folly (sikhluth)." - includes all kinds of enjoyable nonsense.
- His purpose was to discover by personal experience if there was in these things any real good which might satisfy men's cravings, and be a worthy object for them to pursue all the days of their life.
- The enjoyment from wine and other forms of folly is short-lived & profits nothing worthwhile.



- "I made my works great," "for myself" indicates that these projects were not humanitarian but rather for the personal satisfaction of the builder.
- He was 13 years in building his own palace. He also built many other impressive buildings, houses, fortresses; store-cities; chariotcities; and cities in distant lands such as Tadmor in the wilderness (1 Kgs 7; 9; 2 Chron 8).



- Vineyards (Ecc. 2:4; cf. 1 Kings 7:1–11), luxuriant gardens and parks (Ecc. 2:5) filled with trees (2:5–6),
- A great retinue of **slaves** (**2:7**; cf. 1 Kings 10:5) to serve him,
- Musicians to meet his aesthetic needs, a large harem (2:8; cf. 1 Kg 11:1–3) to satisfy his physical desires.
- Herds & flocks (Ecc. 2:7)
- His great treasures of silver and gold (v. 8; cf. 1 Kings 10:14–15, 27)




- Noheleth summarizes the results of the five experiments (2:9–11)
 - "I became great" i.e., he went beyond greatness. The various accomplishments enumerated excelled all who were before him in Jerusalem (cf. 1:16; 2:7).
 - The writer reiterates (cf. 2:3) that his wisdom remained he retained control of himself during his exploration wisdom = earthly prudence and self-restraint (2:9).




- Noheleth summarizes the results of the five experiments (2:9–11)
 - His various experiments had contributed nothing to his anxious inquiry for man's real good. Again "all was vanity, a grasping after wind."
 - In all the pursuits and labors there was no real profit, no lasting happiness, nothing to satisfy "under the sun," (2:11).

Superiority & Inferiority of Wisdom – 2:12-17



- Koheleth now turned his attention to "wisdom, madness, and folly" (cf. 1:17).
 - On one side of the scale he set "wisdom," in the other, those actions and habits which he rightly calls "madness and folly."
 - He weighs the benefits of these two lifestyles his conclusions are conclusive all who examine his experiment will reach the same conclusion (2:12).


Superiority & Inferiority of Wisdom – 2:12-17



Wisdom Superior to Folly (2:13–14a)


- The person who possesses wisdom has the eyes of his heart or understanding enlightened; he looks into the nature of things; he focuses on what is most important; he sees where to go, considers the consequences ...
- The fool, on the other hand, walks on still in darkness, stumbling as he goes, knowing not where his road will take him.

Superiority & Inferiority of Wisdom – 2:12-17




- Though wisdom is superior to folly in life, in at least two respects the wise and the foolish are equal. (2:14b–16)
 - Both the wise and the foolish are doomed to death (2:14b–15; 2 Sam. 3:33; Psalm 49:10. Heb. 9:27).
 - Both the wise and the foolish are forgotten (2:16; Ex. 1:6, 8; Ps. 103:16).

Conclusion (2:17)

- Work ... was grievous to him. (The word trans. "distressing" [rā'] is the antonym of the word trans. "good" or "worthwhile" in vs 1, 3)
- If there is nothing ultimately worthwhile to do, then all of life and all its accomplishments are futile or meaningless, a chasing after the wind (cf. 1:14, 17; 2:11, 17, 26; 4:6, 16; 6:9).

- Cannot be found in wealth 2:7-8a
- Cannot be found in women 2:8b
- Cannot be found in wisdom 2:13-16
