







Ecclesiastes 5:10 (NKJV)

¹⁰ He who loves silver will not be satisfied with silver; Nor he who loves abundance, with increase. This also *is* vanity.










- The problem of injustice (3:16,17)

8 If you see the oppression of the poor, and the violent perversion of justice and righteousness in a province, do not marvel at the matter; for high official watches over high official, and higher officials are over them. 9 Moreover the profit of the land is for all; even the king is served from the field. 10 He who loves silver will not be satisfied with silver; Nor he who loves abundance, with increase. This also is vanity.

¹¹ When goods increase, They increase who eat them; So what profit have the owners Except to see them with their eyes? 12 The sleep of a laboring man is sweet, Whether he eats little or much; But the abundance of the rich will not permit him to sleep. 13 There is a severe evil which I have seen under the sun: Riches kept for their owner to his hurt. ¹⁴ But those riches perish through misfortune; When he begets a son, there is nothing in his hand.

15 As he came from his mother's womb, naked shall he return, To go as he came; And he shall take nothing from his labor Which he may carry away in his hand. 16 And this also is a severe evil—Just exactly as he came, so shall he go. And what profit has he who has labored for the wind? 17 All his days he also eats in darkness, And he has much sorrow and sickness and anger.

18 Here is what I have seen: It is good and fitting for one to eat and drink, and to enjoy the good of all his labor in which he toils under the sun all the days of his life which God gives him; for it is his heritage. 19 As for every man to whom God has given riches and wealth, and given him power to eat of it, to receive his heritage and rejoice in his labor—this is the gift of God.

²⁰ For he will not dwell unduly on the days of his life, because God keeps him busy with the joy of his heart. 1 There is an evil which I have seen under the sun, and it is common among men: ² A man to whom God has given riches and wealth and honor, so that he lacks nothing for himself of all he desires; yet God does not give him power to eat of it, but a foreigner consumes it. This is vanity, and it is an evil affliction.

³ If a man begets a hundred children and lives many years, so that the days of his years are many, but his soul is not satisfied with goodness, or indeed he has no burial, I say that a stillborn child is better than he—4 for it comes in vanity and departs in darkness, and its name is covered with darkness. 5 Though it has not seen the sun or known anything, this has more rest than that man,


⁶ even if he lives a thousand years twice but has not seen goodness. Do not all go to one place? 7 All the labor of man is for his mouth, And yet the soul is not satisfied. 8 For what more has the wise man than the fool? What does the poor man have, Who knows how to walk before the living? 9 Better is the sight of the eyes than the wandering of desire. This also is vanity and grasping for the wind.

10 Whatever one is, he has been named already, For it is known that he is man; And he cannot contend with Him who is mightier than he. 11 Since there are many things that increase vanity, How is man the better? 12 For who knows what is good for man in life, all the days of his vain life which he passes like a shadow? Who can tell a man what will happen after him under the sun?





PROPER PERSPECTIVE ON OPPRESSION




- Power OFTEN breeds corruption, injustice & abuse (8)
 - Oppression does occur, (5:8a; 3:16; 4:1). The cruelty of man over man knows no bounds (Pr 14:31; Am 4:1-3; 5:11,12; etc.)
 - Do NOT Marvel injustice will always be, but there will always be just retribution. even high officials answer to someone else 5:8b; cf. Rom. 13:1; Col. 3:24-4:1


Difficulty in the Hebrew (9)

PROPER PERSPECTIVE ON WEALTH



- Those who love Riches will not find satisfaction (10-17)
- Riches produce more responsibility, anxiety and sleeplessness & harm. (12,13)
- Riches are easily lost (14)
- Riches can't be taken with us (15-17; cf. Job 1:21; Lk 12:13-21)

Ecclesiastes 5:18 (NKJV) Here is what I have seen: It is good and fitting for one to ear and drink, and to enjoy the good of a his labor in which he toils under the sun all the days of his life which God gives him; for it is his heritage.


Riches can be enjoyed w/ RIGHT perspective - (5:18–20)

- "Eat and drink," i.e., to enjoy life; to use the blessings God bestows with thankfulness & contentment (cf. 1 Tim 6:8)
- Abundance is useless without the power to enjoy it Only God can liberate the soul from the slavery to things and enable one truly to enjoy his wealth: "This is the gift of God." (5:19)


Vanity of Success — (6:1-6)

- A rich man with no enjoyment (6:2a, 3a; Luke 12).
- A rich man without an heir all is lost —(6:2b).
- A rich man without a tomb -No honor - (6:3–5)
- A rich man without hope only despair —(6:6).


Wealth & Man's Desire (6:7–9)

- The natural man's labor is for his mouth, i.e., for self-preservation Mt 6:31-33; 1 Tim 6:7-8
- The desires of the heart are never satisfied (6:7; cf. 1:8). The more people pursue pleasure, the more elusive the goal becomes.
- Both the wise & fool must labor for bodily sustenance and neither are satisfied (6:8)










Wealth & Man's Desire (6:7–9)

- The contrast here is between the rich wise man and the prudent poor man both fail at enjoying life, because their desires are insatiable (6:8)
- A bird in the hand is worth two in the bush Make the most of existing opportunities, to enjoy the present (6:9).







Luke 12:13-21 (NKJV)

13 Then one from the crowd said to Him, "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the inheritance with me." 14 But He said to him, "Man, who made Me a judge or an arbitrator over you?" 15 And He said to them, "Take heed and beware of covetousness, for one's life does not consist in the abundance of the things he possesses."
