

# THE BOOK OF 1 TIMOTHY

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
Introduction / Greeting (1 Timothy 1:1-7)
The Lord Jesus Christ Our Hope (1:1,2)
Teach No Other Doctrine (1:3-7)



- **Author**: Paul (1:1)
- **Recipient**: "To Timothy, a true son in the faith" (1:2; cf. Ac 16:1, 2)
  - His grandmother, Lois, and his mother, Eunice, were Jewish, while his father was a Greek (2 Tim. 1:5; Acts 16:1).
  - These women taught Timothy the Holy Scriptures (2 Tim. 3:15).
  - From Lystra, Timothy traveled with Paul throughout the whole of his second journey.
  - On Paul's 3rd journey, Timothy was with him at Ephesus. Near the end of Paul's three years there, Timothy was sent to the churches of Macedonia and Achaia (Acts 19:21, 22; 1 Cor. 4:17; 16:10, 11).




- **Author**: Paul (1:1)
- **Recipient**: "To Timothy, a true son in the faith" (1:2; cf. Ac 16:1, 2)
  - Beloved brother; faithful minister; fellow servant (Col. 4:7)
  - My beloved, fellow worker (Rom 16:3,9, ASV)
  - My partner, fellow-helper (2 Cor 8:23)
  - Companion in labor, fellow-soldier, & fellow-laborer (1 Thes 3:1,2)
  - My beloved son − (1 Cor 4:17)
  - Mine own son in the faith − (1 Tim 1:2)
  - My dearly beloved son (2 Tim 1:2)
  - $\triangleright$  My son (2 Tim 2:1)



## Paul's Activities between his imprisonments in Rome:

- Sailed from Rome to Crete (Titus 1:5).
- Stops at Miletus (2 Timothy 4:20).
- Leaves Timothy in Ephesus (1 Tim. 1:3).
- Stops at Troas (2 Timothy 4:13).
- Writes this letter from somewhere in Macedonia (1 Timothy 1:3). (A.D. 63 65)
- Stops at Corinth (2 Timothy 4:20).
- Prob. wrote to Titus from Corinth before wintering at Nicopolis (Ti 3:12).
- Nicopolis (Titus 3:12).
- Sometime later arrested and taken back to Rome, from where he writes 2 Timothy (2 Timothy 1:17; 4:6-8; 16-17,21).



- Time of writing: Sometime between Paul's first and second imprisonment in Rome. (between A.D. 63 and A.D. 65).
- Place of writing: We do not know probably somewhere in Macedonia.






<sup>1</sup> Paul, an apostle of Jesus Christ, by the commandment of God our Savior and the Lord Jesus Christ, our hope, (1:1)

- Paul, an apostle of Jesus Christ: The word apostle (apostolos) "is, lit., one sent forth (from stello, to send)" (Vine).
  - Although the word is used at a times in the NT in a general sense, (cf. Acts 14:4, 14; Rom. 16:7; I Thess. 2:6). Paul is using it in a specific and official sense (I Cor. 9:1, 2; 2 Cor. 12:11, 12).
  - Paul's apostleship had come to him through a heavenly command (Gal. 1:11–2:2; cf. 1 Tim. 2:7).




- <sup>1</sup> Paul, an apostle of Jesus Christ, by the commandment of God our Savior and the Lord Jesus Christ, our hope, (1:1)
- God our Savior: (cf. 1 Tim. 2:3; 4:10; Titus 1:3; 2:10; 3:4). The Father conceived, designed, & purposed the scheme of redemption.
- Lord Jesus Christ, our hope:
  - lesus is also set forth in the Scriptures as our Savior because of his incarnation, crucifixion, and resurrection (Eph. 5:23; Phil. 3:20; 2 Tim. 1:10; Titus 1:4; 2:13; 3:6).
  - ▶ Jesus is our hope, He has made salvation possible (Col. 1:27; Rom. 5:2; 8:18; Col. 3:4; Heb. 12:1-3).



<sup>2</sup> To Timothy, a true son in the faith: Grace, mercy, *and* peace from God our Father and Jesus Christ our Lord. (1:2)

- Timothy, a true son in the faith: : not according to the flesh, but in the faith, which means, like Titus (Titus 1:4), he was converted by Paul. The word faith is used in the objective sense, hence, the gospel (cf. Acts 6:7; Jude 3)...
  - Grace, mercy, and peace from God our Father and Jesus Christ our Lord.: Paul's fairly standard greeting of grace, and peace, ((Ro I:7; I Co I:3; Ga 6:16; etc.), but adds mercy in his letters to both Timothy & Titus (I Tim I:2; 2 Tim. I:2; Titus I:4) Perhaps a reference to suffering.


#### Teach No Other Doctrine (I Tim. I:3-7)



#### 1 Timothy 1:3–7 (NKJV)

<sup>3</sup> As I urged you when I went into Macedonia—remain in Ephesus that you may charge some that they teach no other doctrine, 4 nor give heed to fables and endless genealogies, which cause disputes rather than godly edification which is in faith. <sup>5</sup> Now the purpose of the commandment is love from a pure heart, from a good conscience, and from sincere faith, <sup>6</sup> from which some, having strayed, have turned aside to idle talk, <sup>7</sup> desiring to be teachers of the law, understanding neither what they say nor the things which they affirm.

#### Teach No Other Doctrine (I Tim. I:3-7)



As I urged you when I went into Macedonia
 —remain in Ephesus that you may charge some that they teach no other doctrine,

#### **False Doctrines and Problems:**

- Speculative intellectualism: (1:4; 6:4).
- Jewish myths and genealogies: (1:4)
- Misuse of the Old Testament: (1:7)
- Some had lost their faith: (1:19-20)
- Asceticism: (4:1-4)
- Members living worldly lives: (5:6,11).
- Not providing for one's family: (5:8).
- A false pride that leads into errors: (6:3-4)
- Materialism & love of money: (6:6-9,17)
- Pseudo-knowledge: (6:20; 4:7).

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## Acts 16:1-5 (NKJV)

<sup>1</sup> Then he came to Derbe and Lystra. And behold, a certain disciple was there, named Timothy, the son of a certain Jewish woman who believed, but his father was Greek. <sup>2</sup> He was well spoken of by the brethren who were at Lystra and Iconium. <sup>3</sup> Paul wanted to have him go on with him. And he took him and circumcised him because of the Jews who were in that region, for they all knew that his father was Greek. <sup>4</sup> And as they went through the cities, they delivered to them the decrees to keep, which were determined by the apostles and elders at Jerusalem. <sup>5</sup> So the churches were strengthened in the faith, and increased in number daily.
