


#### James 5:7–12 (NKJV)

<sup>7</sup> Therefore be patient, brethren, until the coming of the Lord. See how the farmer waits for the precious fruit of the earth, waiting patiently for it until it receives the early and latter rain. 8 You also be patient. Establish your hearts, for the coming of the Lord is at hand. 9 Do not grumble against one another, brethren, lest you be condemned. Behold, the Judge is standing at the door! <sup>10</sup> My brethren, take the prophets, who spoke in the name of the Lord, as an example of suffering and patience. 11 Indeed we count them blessed who endure. You have heard of the perseverance of Job and seen the end intended by the Lord—that the Lord is very compassionate and merciful. 12 But above all, my brethren, do not swear, either by heaven or by earth or with any other oath. But let your "Yes" be "Yes," and your "No," "No," lest you fall into judgment.



Original Word: μακροθυμέω, makrothymeō

makrothumeo (μακροθυμέω, 3114), akin to A, No. 2, "to be long-tempered," is translated "to have patience," or "to be patient," in Matt. 18:26, 29; 1 Thess. 5:14, kjv (rv, "be longsuffering"); Jas. 5:7 (1st part, "be patient"; 2nd part, rv, "being patient," kjv, "hath long patience"); in Heb. 6:15, rv, "having (kjv, after he had) patiently endured." See longsuffering.

Original Word: μακροθυμέω, makrothymeō

Note: "Longsuffering is that quality of selfrestraint in the face of provocation which does not hastily retaliate or promptly punish; it is the opposite of anger, and is associated with mercy, and is used of God, Ex. 34:6 (Sept.); Rom. 2:4; 1 Pet. 3:20. Patience is the quality that does not surrender to circumstances or succumb under trial; it is the opposite of despondency and is associated with hope, 1 Thess. 1:3; it is not used of God."\*

6 who "will render to each one according to his deeds": 7 eternal life to those who by patient continuance in doing good seek for glory, honor, and immortality;




#### Romans 8:23-25 (NKJV)




#### 1 Thessalonians 1:3 (NKJV)


<sup>3</sup> remembering without ceasing your work of faith, labor of love, and patience of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ in the sight of our God and Father,



- The need for continuance (vs. 7; Rom. 2:7; Heb. 6:11,12; Rev. 2:10)
- Example of the farmer (vs. 7; Dependence upon God's provisions – Hos. 6:3; Joel 2:23)
- **Establish your hearts** (vs. 8; Ps 27:14; 28:7; 112:7,8; Pr. 3:5; 4:23; 1 Thess. 3:13)
- Do not complain, grumble, or swear (vs. 9; 1 Co. 10:10;1 Pt. 4:9; Acts 23:12)



- Consider the prophets and their end (vs. 10, 11a; Acts 7:52; Heb. 11:32-12:3; Mat. 5:10,11; 10:22)
- Consider the perseverance of Job and the end intended by God (vs. 11; Job 23:10; 42:10-17; Eccl. 7:8; 1 Pet. 1:6,7; 2 Pet. 2:9)
- Consider our lack of control (vs. 12; 4:13-17; Mt. 5:33-37; 6:25-34; Ac 23:12)



- Until the coming of the Lord (7; Acts 17:31; Rom. 2:7)
- For the coming of the Lord is at hand [patience, not vengeance] (8; Rom. 13:12; Heb. 10:25; 1 Pet. 4:7)
- The judge is standing at the door (9; cf. Matt. 24:33; Rev. 3:3, 20;, Matt. 24:45-51; Luke 12:42-46)

# THEREFORE BE PATIENT, BRETHREN, UNTIL THE COMING OF THE LORD Some Negative Consequences Of Impatience



- Continual dissatisfaction, upset, and angry with ourselves and others.
- Easily lose our control and fire off outbursts of anger, temper, and blame on others.
- We become a member of the "throw away" generation, discarding relationships, people, jobs, school, churches etc.
- We waste energy worrying about how slow things are changing instead of directing the energy toward the changes we desire.

# THEREFORE BE PATIENT, BRETHREN, UNTIL THE COMING OF THE LORD Some Negative Consequences Of Impatience




- We withdraw prematurely from a helping situation because we are not seeing an immediate pay off for our efforts.
- We sacrifice friendships and relationships prematurely because the other person is not changing as quickly or as thoroughly as we desire.
- We ignore all of the positive gains we and others have made on the road to recovery and growth, only concentrating on what has not yet been accomplished.

# THEREFORE BE PATIENT, BRETHREN, UNTIL THE COMING OF THE LORD Some Negative Consequences Of Impatience



- We become pessimistic and fail to count our blessings.
- expecting to see immediate results, we burn ourselves out – and neglect other important things, we become discouraged when the goals are not instantly realized.
- We lose the ability to take a large goal and break it down into manageable increments.
- We become overwhelmed by the large tasks ahead of us and lose the hope and motivation to keep on trying.

#### Hebrews 12:1-3 (NKJV)

<sup>1</sup> Therefore we also, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, <sup>2</sup> looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. <sup>3</sup> For consider Him who endured such hostility from sinners against Himself, lest you become weary and discouraged in your souls.

Therefore do not cast away your confidence, which has great reward. <sup>36</sup> For you have need of endurance, so that after you have done the will of God, you may receive the promise — Hebrews 10:35,36

#### Hebrews 10:32-39 (NKJV)

<sup>32</sup> But recall the former days in which, after you were illuminated, you endured a great struggle with sufferings: <sup>33</sup> partly while you were made a spectacle both by reproaches and tribulations, and partly while you became companions of those who were so treated; <sup>34</sup> for you had compassion on me in my chains, and joyfully accepted the plundering of your goods, knowing that you have a better and an enduring possession for yourselves in heaven. <sup>35</sup> Therefore do not cast away your confidence, which has great reward. <sup>36</sup> For you have need of endurance, so that after you have done the will of God, you may receive the promise: <sup>37</sup> "For yet a little while, And He who is coming will come and will not tarry. <sup>38</sup> Now the just shall live by faith; But if anyone draws back, My soul has no pleasure in him." <sup>39</sup> But we are not of those who draw back to perdition, but of those who believe to the saving of the soul.
