

We have wronged no one, we have corrupted no one, we have cheated no one. 3 I do not say this to condemn; for I have said before that you are in our hearts, to die together and to live together. 4 Great is my boldness of speech toward you, great is my boasting on your behalf. I am filled with comfort. I am exceedingly joyful in all our tribulation.

2 CORINTHIANS 7:2-16 (NKJV)

⁵ For indeed, when we came to Macedonia, our bodies had no rest, but we were troubled on every side. And we rejoiced exceedingly more for the joy of Titus, because his spirit has been refreshed by you all.

But as we spoke all things to you in truth, even so our boasting to Titus was found true. 15 And his affections are greater for you as he remembers the obedience of you all, how with fear and trembling you received him. ¹⁶ Therefore I rejoice that I have confidence in you in everything.

Plea For Mutual Affection - (7:2-4)




2 Corinthians 7:2 (NKJV)

² Open *your hearts* to us. We have wronged no one, we have corrupted no one, we have cheated no one.

- ◆ After having admonished the Corinthians to pursue righteousness, purity & holiness, Paul resumes his appeal for reciprocal love - (7:2; cf. 6:11-13)
 - → "Make room for us in your hearts" - (cf. 6:12,13)
 - ★ We have wronged no-one done no harm; led none into error; had not taken advantage of them (6:3-7; 11:7; 1 Cor. 9:18)

Plea For Mutual Affection - (7:2-4)



- → Paul expresses concern that his "boldness of speech might be understood" — 7:3
 - → "Not to shame, but to warn" —
 (cf. 4:14)
 - → "You are in our hearts" (3:2;
 11:11; 12:15; cf. Phi. 1:8, 9)
 - ★ To face deadly peril, and to face deliverance with them (1:4-7), perhaps pointing to dying with Christ and living together with Him (6:14-17)

Plea For Mutual Affection - (7:2-4)



² Corinthians 7:4 (NKJV)
⁴ Great *is* my boldness of speech toward you, great *is* my boasting on your behalf. I am filled with comfort. I am exceedingly joyful in all our tribulation.

- → Paul expresses his confidence in the Corinthians — 7:4
 - → "Boldness of speech" Paul had confidence that the truth would produce positive results (cf. 3:12)
 - → "Great is my boasting" Paul had high expectations of them (1:14; 9:2-4.)
 - → Paul was comforted by Titus' report, (6,7), — He KNOWS his efforts have not been in vain — (6:10; Phili 2:17; Col 1:24)

Paul Expresses His Great Relief - (7:5-7)




2 Corinthians 7:5 (NKJV)
⁵ For indeed, when we came to Macedonia, our bodies had no rest, but we were troubled on every side.

Outside *were* conflicts, inside *were* fears.

- → Paul expresses his deep concern for them, for himself and for Titus — 7:5
 - → His concern for them (cf. 2:4)
 - → His concern for himself he experienced trouble on every side
 (cf. 4:8)
 - → Paul was deeply concerned for Titus — (2:13)
 - → Paul was feeling the effects of his battles - but ...

Paul Expresses His Great Relief - (7:5-7)



2 Corinthians 7:6-7 (NKJV) ⁶ Nevertheless God, who comforts the downcast, comforted us by the coming of Titus, ⁷ and not only by his coming, but also by the consolation with which he was comforted in you, when he told us of your earnest desire, your mourning, your zeal for me, so that I rejoiced even more.

Paul's Joy Over Their Repentance - (7:8-11)




2 Corinthians 7:8 (NKJV)

⁸ For even if I made you sorry with my letter, I do not regret it; though I did regret it. For I perceive that the same epistle made you sorry, though only for a while.

→ Paul had not relished his role as a disciplinarian — Yet due of the results, his regret turns to great joy (cf. 2:6; 7:9).

⁹ Now I rejoice, not that you were made sorry, but that your sorrow led to repentance. For you were made sorry in a godly manner, that you might suffer loss from us in nothing.

Paul's Joy Over Their Repentance - (7:8-11)



- ★ Repentance is not merely godly sorrow, but the result of godly sorrow — (Mat 27:3-5; Mat 26:69-75)
- ◆ Which leads to salvation —
 (Luke 13:3,5; Acts 17:30; Eze.
 18:20-32; 2 Pet 3:9)
- No one will EVER regret having repented of their sins, especially after they enter into glory (Rom 8:18,19ff; 1 Pet 1:3-9; etc.)

- Repentance is not merely godly sorrow, but the result of godly sorrow — (Mat 27:3-5; 26:69-75)
- ♦ Which leads to salvation (Luke 13:3,5; Acts 17:30; Eze. 18:20-32; 2 Pet 3:9)
- No one will EVER regret having repented of their sins, especially after they enter into glory — (Rom 8:18,19ff; 1 Pet 1:3-9; etc.)
- Worldly sorrow will be regretted forever — (Mat 27:4, 5; He. 12:17.)

Paul's Joy Over Their Repentance - (7:8-11)

2 Corinthians 7:11 (NKJV) ¹¹ For observe this very thing, that you sorrowed in a godly manner: What diligence it produced in you, what clearing of yourselves, what indignation, what fear, what vehement desire, what zeal, what vindication! In all things you proved yourselves to be clear in this matter.

- ◆The FRUIT of true repentance 7:11
 - Diligence
 - Clearing of themselves
 - Indignation (righteous)
 - Fear (reverence)
 - Vehement desire (right)
 - Zeal (effort)
- Proved their repentance!

Paul's Concern Was Their Obedience - (7:12)




2 Corinthians 7:12 (NKJV)

wrong, but that our care for
you in the sight of God
might appear to you.


- ◆ Paul's primary concern was that the Corinthian's deal with the sin that was in the camp — (1 Cor. 5)
 - Also that they accept his authority as an apostle of Jesus Christ (1 Cor 14:37)
- Paul rejoiced however at the results for all parties involved.



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
